What do they have in common?

It all started with DEC's Display Energy Certificates

- to raise public awareness of energy use and to inform visitors to public buildings about the energy
- an energy rating of the building from A to G, where
- A is very efficient and G is the least efficient and are based on the *actual* amount of
- metered energy used by the building over a period of 12 months.
- must display a DEC in a prominent place clearly visible to the public and have in its possession or control a valid advisory report.
- The introduction of DECs will for the first time give publicly accessible information
- on the energy performance of public buildings.
- It is important not only that the public sector complies but that it is seen to be setting an example.
- Environmental performance is increasingly important to reputation. Accordingly if there is any

What Buildings?

- At the moment any with a useful floor area of 1000m² or above
- It is lighty to reduce down to 250m²

What is required?

- Actual energy consumption as recorded for the main heating (meter readings) gas/oil/biomass and electricity for the previous year
- Also details of any onsite generation

Penalties for not having a DEC

- A local authority can issue a penalty charge notice of £500 for failing to display a DEC
- at all times in a prominent place clearly visible to the public, and £1,000 for failing to
- possess or have in their control a valid advisory report. In addition to these penalties,
- it will still be necessary to commission the documents, otherwise **further offences** will be committed.
- ISSUEING THEM ON YOURSELF ?

So what do they have to do with NI185?

- The public sector is in a key position to lead on efforts to reduce CO2 emissions by setting a behavioural and strategic example to the private sector and the communities they serve. The way in which the local authority delivers its functions can achieve CO2 emissions reductions.
- The aim of this indicator is to measure the progress of local authorities in reducing CO2 emissions from the relevant buildings and transport used to deliver their functions and to encourage them to demonstrate leadership on tackling climate change.
- Measurement against this indicator requires each local authority to calculate its CO2 emissions from analysis of the energy and fuel use in their relevant buildings and transport, including where these services have been outsourced.

Do you work with or for a Local Authority?

- Then keep records of your carbon emissions
- That includes petrol for the lawn mower!
- They will be required

Reporting

- **The first reporting year will be the financial year 2008/09. This represents a change from original intentions, reflecting the fact that the proposed reporting period for the Carbon Reduction Commitment (CRC) is now based on the financial year. Keeping the reporting period for this indicator and the CRC will help reduce reporting burdens.**

CRC's

- Are you up to speed?
- Have you appointed your Administrator?
- Do you have the funds?
- Have you told any one?

So what I'm not doing it!

- Criminal and Civil Law
- Fail to register? £5000 +£500 per day
- Late £5000+5p per tonne per day X2 if the administrator does it and your sent to the bottom of the table!
- Not enough allowances or more than 5% out £40 per tonne
- No evidence pack £5 per tonne
- Your Consultants get it wrong you get the fine!

What will it cost me and how much could I lose?

- £600,000 first purchase
- By year 5 it could be as much as £2.6Million

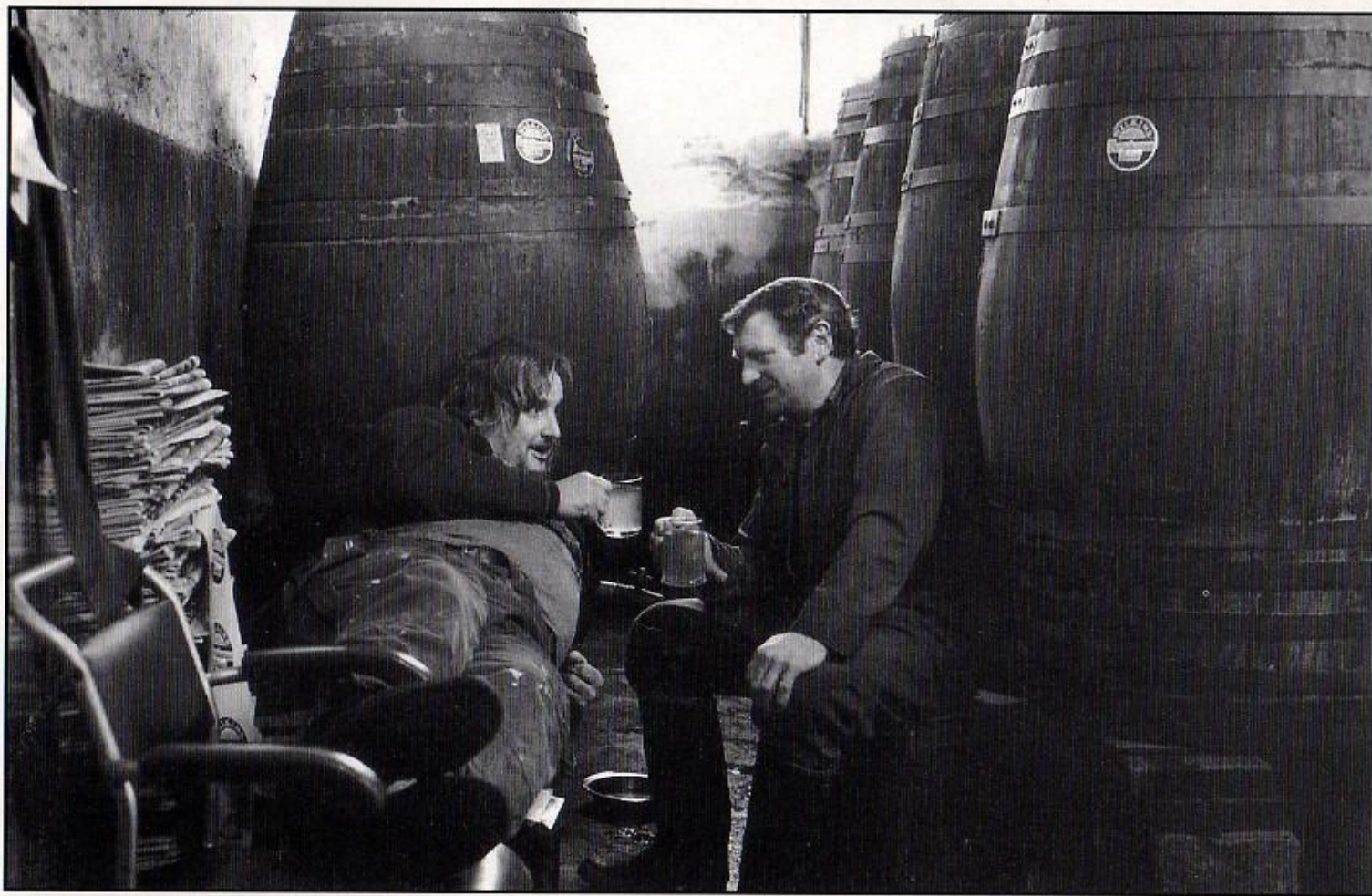
